Time to sign up for Evo Schools

Salina Region's annual Evolution Performance Driving Schools are scheduled for April 13-14-15. Registration is open now at <u>www.evoschool.com</u>.

You can take any one school, do two of them or all three, and there's discounts for multiple schools

April 13, Friday, is Phase 1. The basics. If you're new to autocross, this is the fundamentals you need to be quick. If you're experienced, this is all that stuff you either forgot or never quite got good at.


April 14, Saturday, is Phase 2. You've done Phase 1, you've got the pieces, now you work on putting the package together.

April 15, Sunday, is the Challenge School. Take all that stuff from P1 and P2, learn how to apply it to a different context, and be fast on any course. And at the end of the day you go mano a mano with your instructor. He'll push you to beat him.

Your instructors are top caliber autocrossers. Many are national champions. They'll put you though exercises designed to teach you winning autocross technique, and you'll get what seems like a season of solo in a weekend. And that means, don't come on that brand new set of donuts with the stickers still on them. Use up your old tires, even basic street rubber.

It starts with driver's meeting at 8:30 am and runs virtually non-stop to late afternoon. The lunch break is a discussion period (lunch and drinks are provided).

To register go to www.evoschool.com, scroll down the calendar to EVOLUTION WEEKEND WITH SALINA REGION SCCA, and click the link. Cost is \$260 for one school, \$500 for two, \$730 for all three.



Heats and Grids for **2018** season

The Salina Region 2018 Solo Season will make use of the same (mostly) 2-heat setup as last year but with a slight variation in our grid plan.

GRIDS – We will continue with two heats as last year for our local events (unless we get an entry of more than 50 cars, which could instigate a 3-heat setup – this change would be announced at driver's meeting). Group A forms up on the east side of the grid and Group B forms up on the west side nearest Markley Road.

The new wrinkle is that we will no longer assign grid places. Park wherever you want, just be on the correct side. The first five slots on each side are reserved for 2-driver cars, the rest are open. Put your car in a grid slot and leave it there all day. If you come with a tow vehicle and trailer, park it in the grass right behind your grid slot. Park it so trailer ramps just barely touch the concrete.

A car with two drivers in the same heat, even if in different classes (one chooses BS, the other STO8, for example) still goes in the 2-driver slots. But if the two drivers are in different heats (FS and FSL, for example), they should take a slot on the first-heat side then move the car to the other side for the second heat. Yes, it's allowed to grab a one of the giant pylons and save the space directly across.

The two groups will alternate heat 1 and heat 2 through the season. Group A runs heat 1 at the first event in March, Group B runs heat 1 at the May event. And so forth.

Wait! What happened to April? That's the Evo School weekend when we run our doubleheader solos at the south end of the East Crawford Rec site. Because of space limitations we'll need to use the old-style grid setup there.

Preliminary rules under open review for Time Trials Nationals

TOPEKA, Kan. (Feb. 23, 2018) – In 2018 the <u>Time Trials</u> <u>Nationals</u> joins the ranks of the SCCA National Championship Runoffs, Tire Rack Solo Nationals, DirtFish SCCA RallyCross National Championship and United States Road

Rally Challenge. The event, slated to take place Sept. 28-30 at NCM Motorsports Park in Bowling Green, Ky., opens with a full day of track



lapping sessions for testing and practice which can also be used for participants to earn their TT novice license permit.

A first draft of rules for the new Time Trials Nationals program is now available online for analysis at www.sccahq.com/time-trials-rules. SCCA members and nonmembers alike now have until March 15 to review the preliminary rules and share thoughts or ideas through the form at www.scca.com/forms/time-trials-feedback.

The interactive TT Nationals rules page provides a general description for each of the four competition levels, search out a detailed rundown of rules for each level, and peruse safety guidelines. Heyward Wagner, SCCA's Director of Marketing and Experiential Programs, said a committee consisting of SCCA members and national staff has been working together to create this first iteration of TT Nationals rules.

"Before writing any of these rules, the Time Trials Board discussed the purpose of the program. While other programs focus on parity, balanced performance and spec competition, it was felt that TT offers an opportunity to focus more on development, progression and performance," Wagner said.

"From this, we arrived at the idea that Time Trials is all about a quest for speed. So, the rules are designed to allow for more freedom and creativity than one might find in autocross or road racing. And, while that is important in establishing an identity for TT, it is equally important to create a culture for TT Nationals where participants can first challenge themselves to set a personal best or record, but also create a space for a collective effort to challenge the track."

The TT Nationals rules were constructed to outline modifications and preparations that can be made in each of the four TT Nationals car classes. At one end of the spectrum is the "entry level" where simple modifications can be accomplished using tools purchased at nearly any local hardware store. At the other end of the spectrum is the "anything goes" class where creativity is welcomed and practically any car modification is allowed.

The second day of TT Nationals will open with 20-minute seeding sessions used to determine run groups and orders, followed by a traditional time attack in the afternoon where drivers get one warm-up lap, then have a single lap to post their best time. For the final day of TT Nationals, NCM Motorsports Park will be divided into sections for point-topoint runs. Each competitor will have multiple chances to put down their best time on shortened segments of track.

Working the Road Races

Club racing season is here again! The first race of the season is the Super Tour at Hallett, Okla., Spr. 7-8, followed by a Majors at Heartland Motorsports Park, Topeka, April 21-22. There's another regional-race weekend at Heartland July 21-22 and a Regional at Hallett Sept. 1-2. Other MiDiv races will be held at Iowa Speedway, Newton, Iowa, and Raceway Park of the Midlands south of Omaha, Neb.

It takes a great many people to put on a successful race, making it difficult for one region alone to do so. Along with workers from local regions, wonderful workers from many other SCCA Regions come to help. If you are interested in participating in a club race, there are many different specialties available, such as:

Flagging and Communications (F&C) – Corner workers are certainly among the most visible of workers since they spend their time out on the corners during the event. Their job is to communicate by radio with the officials directing the race, display the necessary flags, and assist drivers having difficulties near their corner station.

Timing and Scoring – As the name implies, this group is responsible for determining a car's time and position during practices and races. Both of these functions are critical to drivers participating in the event. If you prefer to be inside out of the weather, this is an ideal place to work.

Grid and Pits – These workers line the drivers up at the start of a practice or race, check them for the proper safety equipment, and help control the hot pits during the event. Grid workers get the opportunity to interact with all of the drivers, probably more than any other specialty.

Scrutineering (Tech) – Besides issuing tech stickers to cars with annual tech inspections before the cars go on track, tech is responsible for determining if cars conform to the safety rules and the requirements for the individual classes. After the races, the top 3 cars in each class report to tech to be weighed and checked.

Hospitality – Hospitality workers make copies of the grid sheets and results and distribute them to the drivers. After the results are final, they hand out the trophies. And they are there to try to answer questions that the drivers might have, or, at least, to direct them to the right person for an answer.

Registration – At the track, registration workers check licenses and make sure that participants have the correct current credentials. They make sure that anybody without a current annual waiver signs the event waiver and give the drivers and workers the information they need for the event. This specialty is extremely busy for a couple of hours on Friday evening and a couple of hours on Saturday morning.

Working the races earns a member points under the Midwest Division's VROOM program, an incentive program for workers. These points can be redeemed for MiDiv apparel and bank gift cards. This program is explained in full on the MiDiv website, www.midiv.org. Volunteering at the races also reduces the costs of membership. A reduction in membership fees is given for each day worked. This is financed by a surcharge on each entry that is paid by the drivers. (*Lifted from NeOkla Region website*)

Tire Rack becomes title sponsor of Solo's CAM Challenge

TOPEKA, Kan. (Feb. 22, 2018) – The Sports Car Club of America has announced a multiyear agreement with Tire Rack to become the title sponsor of the CAM Challenge Powered By SCCA.

Howard Duncan, SCCA Senior Director of Rally/Solo, said starting in 2018 Tire Rack CAM Challenge will become part of the Tire Rack SCCA National Solo program. Tire Rack's involvement in CAM will further raise the profile of the growing series, which has become one of the largest muscle-car events in the country in just four years.

"We believe this partnership with Tire Rack will further CAM's status in the muscle car community," Duncan said. "CAM, the acronym for Classic American Muscle, has become synonymous with muscle cars, SCCA and autocrossing. And including Tire Rack CAM Challenge Powered by SCCA in two ProSolo weekends, featuring the 'drag race' format, will certainly raise some eyebrows this year."

Matt Edmonds, Executive Vice President of Tire Rack, said, "Tire Rack is excited to be working with the SCCA to further the muscle-car pro touring movement adding to the largest group of grassroots motorsports participants in the world."

This year, the Tire Rack CAM Challenge has four events planned. The first is April 20-22 at Crows Landing, Calif.; followed by a second event June 1-3 Mineral Wells, Texas. The third event will take place Aug. 10-12 at Grissom Aeroplex in Bunker Hill, Ind.; then the series wraps up Sept. 1-2 with the Tire Rack CAM Challenge Invitational at Lincoln Airpark in soln Neb

Lincoln, Neb.

The Tire Rack CAM Challenge Powered by SCCA will continue to have three classes for muscle cars. The CAM-T (Traditional) class is for car and truck body styles originating from 1954-1989 with a minimum weight without driver being 2950 pounds. The CAM-C (Contemporary) class houses car and truck body styles from 1990 and newer, all of which must have a minimum weight without driver of 3250 pounds. The CAM-S (Sport) class is for two-seater cars.

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The Salina Region Solo Championship ~ 2018

1. Points will be scored at all of Salina Region's Regional Solo events (also referred to as "local" events, including the R.E. Challenge at Yoder). Points also will be scored at the MiDiv Solo Series Divisional in Salina June 2-3 and at the SCCA Solo Nationals in Lincoln, Neb. Sep. 4-7 (*NOTE: for 2018 that is 13 local events, plus a Divisional event and the Nationals, total 15 events.*)

2. Points will be scored for every driver at each Salina Region event on the basis of: 12-9-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for the top nine drivers. Any driver placing 10th or lower will also receive one point.

3. Points will be compiled at year-end only for Salina Region members. Drivers eligible for the Salina Region Solo Championships must be Salina Region members (Region of Record or Associate) by the end of September. Weekend Membership does **<u>Not</u>** satisfy this requirement.

4. To encourage participation in a Divisional Championship event conducted by Salina Region (if held) and the SCCA Solo Nationals, those events will score regular points as in Item 2 above, plus competitors will score a bonus of up to 10 points for every car they beat. For example, a driver placing 15th at Nationals (1 point) in a 28-car class will score a total of 11 points; a driver placing 4th (6 points) in a 5-car class will score a total of 7 points.

5. Of the possible 15 events that can be scored in 2017, the best 11 will be counted. A driver must score points in a minimum of four <u>local</u> Salina Region events, which includes the R.E. Challenge event at Yoder, but does not include the Divisional at Salina because it is a bonus event. (*NOTE: the throw-out total is calculated by taking the Nationals, our Divisional when held, plus two Regional events.*)

6. One car makes a class. Cars must be legal for the class entered.

7. A driver may compete only once for points at any event. Second-entry runs (fun runs) will not count for points and will not take positions away. The first class in which a driver competes is the class in which points are scored.


8. A driver competing in more than one class during the year will score points in each class separately.

9. Drivers competing in three or more classes through the year will be considered for the "Wild Car-d" awards. Points scored in Wild Car-d will be those scored in the regular class. Wild Car-d award winners cannot be an award winner in any other class.

10. Ties for awards will be broken first by going to the driver who scores the most wins; second to the driver who beats the other the most in head-to-head competition. If still tied, it will stand and duplicate awards will be given.

11. Should a driver qualify for championship awards in two or more classes, one award will be given representing the highest placing with all qualified-for classes listed thereon.

SO YOU WANT TO TRY AUTOCROSSING? HERE'S HOW

Because SCCA Solo uses rubber traffic cones to build a course on large parking lots or inactive airstrips, the hazards and barriers to entry are low and that makes autocross one of the easiest and least expensive ways to compete in a car. While speeds are generally no greater than those encountered in highway driving, the combination of concentration and precision maneuvering leaves many drivers with their heart racing and hands trembling from adrenaline after a run.

Although there are many ways to go autocross and the effort can be as easy or as intense as you want, the basics are simple. Do you know someone who thinks they might like to try autocrossing, but isn't sure how to get started, You might show them this article from scca.com



What you need

Driver's License: Unless you're entering one of the Karting classes, you will need a current driver's license to enter an SCCA Solo event. Bring it with you to show the people working registration you're good to go.

Tip – If you are under 18, you will need both your parents to sign a minor waiver for you.

Vehicle in good working order: Although autocrossing doesn't require the same safety gear that you might see in race cars, you will need to make sure that your car (or kart) is in good shape with no loose/worn suspension parts, your car battery is securely held in place, your tires have no cord or metal showing, your car's brakes and seatbelts are in good shape and it has no big fluid leaks.

Tip – *The event's tech inspector will ensure your car is ready.* **Helmet**: You will need a helmet when you're driving on course, but you can usually use a "loaner" helmet provided by the host region. If you bring your own, it has to meet certain safety standards – more than just "DOT-Approved." The most common certifications are Snell "M" and "SA" and need to have the number 2005 or higher after the letters. ECE R22.05 certified helmets are also allowed and are common at motorcycle shops.

Tip – *The tech inspector will check your helmet too.*

How to participate

Find an event: You can find schedules on local websites – salinascca.org, wichitascca.org, ksscca.org, kcrscca.org, etc. **Register:** It's best to pre-register, although usually walk-in entries are accepted. Most regions have signup online at motorsportsreg.com, which is also a good source to find nearby events. You'll have to create an account (it's free). Regional events tend to cost \$20 to \$40 to enter.

Tip – SCCA members are a helpful bunch. If you arrive early and tell someone you have never done it, chances are you're going to get walked through the process. You'll probably even make some new friends along the way. **Show up:** The next step is to go to an event, check in at registration, sign the waiver. Autocrosses tend to pack a lot into a day so pay close attention to the schedule.

Tip – Autocrosses tend to run in any weather. Bring appropriate clothing and weather gear, closed-toed shoes, and drinks/snacks for the day. Get your car checked out: The safety inspection, also known as "Tech," is where one of your fellow autocrossers will doublecheck your car and make sure it passes all those safety items. They will look under the hood, inside the interior and trunk, check your tires, make sure your suspension is tight, make sure your helmet is

good to go, and see that there aren't any loose pieces on/in your car. Your battery will be checked so be sure it's secured properly (no bungee cords).

Tip – It's best to come to tech with your car empty and when you get there open the hood and trunk for the inspectors. Also, if you don't have numbers you might have to ask for some low-sticky "painters tape" to make numbers and class letters. Walk the course: Since you will only get a few runs on the course it's important to walk and "plan" how to drive it. You probably want to get there in time to walk the course at least 2-3 times and they usually take 10-15 minutes per walk. Tip – Ask another member to help you walk through it. Just like asking for help before, you'll probably make a new friend. Help Out: One of the things that makes autocross less expensive than other forms of motorsports is that competitors are also organizers and helpers. That person who helped you

sign the waiver? They're probably driving today. The person who helped you register? Yep, also driving. You get the idea. Actually every competitor is also a worker, most of them taking a turn on course shagging cones.

Tip - Try for a work assignment early in the day when you can watch other competitors before it's your turn to drive. **Drive:** This one is kind of self-explanatory. There will probably be an area for "grid" where you park between runs, and grid workers will tell you when to go up to the line to make your run. Have fun, look at your time, repeat. Tip - Look ahead and relax. Looking ahead helps you see where the course is better, and relaxing enables you to feel what the car is doing better so that you can ultimately get a better time.

So that's it – those are some of the essential facts of what you need to know and how to go autocrossing. From there, SCCA Solo has more levels of driving including a school to make you a better driver, Solo National Tours, a Solo National Championship, and even ProSolo series. There are classes for full-bore race cars, cars right off the showroom floor, and several levels in between.
