Not too long ago, I attended a two-day Advanced Competition school put on by the recently reborn Skip Barber Racing School at Sebring International Raceway. The whole experience kind of jumpstarted the idea for this column, which is how fun and rewarding it is to learn stuff.

First, I'll say that although I get a healthy amount of seat time, it wasn't long after our two-day school started that I realized that

pure seat time is no substitute for proper coaching and feedback time. Modern data gathering and analysis systems make it easy to get plenty of objective feedback during your track time, but ultimately there's no

substitute for the accountability provided by another human standing there telling you what you did right or wrong.

You can't have a discussion with a data acquisition system, and although the data is accurate, it can also be difficult to contextualize without the input of another driver who has done the same thing you're trying to do, only better.

So, going to an honest-to-goodness racing school – my first in more than a decade – felt like a lot of payoff in the education department. The structured, repetitive approach, with constant and specific feedback, was far more valuable than simply turning laps and looking at graphs afterward. It let me focus on specific skills and techniques in an environment where there was no pressure from clocks or competition.

So that's one reward of education: You just end up better at stuff. But there are other benefits as well, not the least of which is the people you get to meet on the journey to greater knowledge.

Look, if someone's teaching you something, chances are they know more about that thing than you, right? I find people who know a lot to be fascinating characters to begin with, and what a bonus when you get to sponge a little knowledge off them. And one day, you might be lucky enough to have someone whose career you've admired share some of their precious brain with you.

Two of my instructors at this particular Skip Barber school were Bruce MacInnes and Terry Earwood, cats that I'd be excited just to hang out with for a little while. Bruce made a name for himself in the later, single-seat days of the Can-Am series, when the cars were barely disguised F5000 monsters sporting full bodywork and setting outright lap records at many of the circuits they visited. Bruce has driven stuff so fast he's probably traveled back in time a little bit.

And having Terry Earwood give you Sebring pointers? I mean, come on. The road that leads into the track is named after his family. If that doesn't give a guy some credibility, I don't know what does.

Anyway, the point is this: Learning from experts exposes you not only to amazing information, but likely amazing people, too. And I'd like to think it's one of my goals to expose myself to as many amazing people as I can whenever I have the chance. That sort of came out wrong, but you get the idea.

Then there's the sheer, selfish thrill of new knowledge and newly acquired skills. The feeling that you possess some ability or information that you didn't have, possibly even a few minutes prior, is a powerful and satisfying feeling. When you're conscious of that moment of discovery or breakthrough, there's few better highs.

I remember the first time I went over the bypass at Thunderhill at 10/10ths – a blind, cresting leap into a quick right-hand turn. You need to begin your direction adjustment before the top of the hill, which means you need to commit before you can really see anything. And when you do it quickly enough, there are a few precious moments when the car is unweighted enough that you

really can't make any meaningful directional adjustments until the car settles back down perilously close to the corner entry. So, you need to take this leap of faith on the near side of the crest, hoping your muscle memory and

track knowledge sets you down on the correct line on the far side. And that first time you get it right? Magic.

And the most magical part about it? That feeling that even though you just did something for the first time, and it was hard, and took skill, courage and faith, there was also this feeling that one day you'll have done it enough times that it will be mundane. Ordinary. Dare I say easy. Knowing you just took the first step on that path is pretty powerful.

I never intend to lose that thrill of discovery and learning, and that Skippy school really reminded me how satisfying and reinvigorating the process of discovery is. I challenge you, gentle reader, to never stop seeking knowledge. I guarantee it's worth the effort, and I can't wait to hear about the latest thing you learned.

Open Forum – Dennis suggested donating old PA system and old radios (some may need repair) to K-State or McPherson College. Board agreed.



Perhaps you found the letter in the adjacent text box in your email last month. Perhaps you just quickly passed it by, deleting it unread along with all the other advertisements, junk mail and assorted spam that fills the mailbox these days. Look again.

I'm already signed up. This is one of the best bargains your SCCA membership provides, the opportunity to be "in the know" about our club, how it functions, and how you can have an even greater effect on it, *FOR FREE!*

I have attended several SCCA conventions pre-pandemic. The first was in 1974 when sweet serendipity dealt me my first SCCA award the year SCCA met in San Francisco, where I grew up and my parents lived. It was surreal riding the #38 Geary St. bus home late at night after the Saturday banquet, a silver goblet on my lap, the Best Story award for a writeup I'd sent to SportsCar on the Lake Afton Grand Prix.

Thing is, that one only cost me a trip back home, and any good excuse to go home really didn't count as a convention expense. I was also the newly elected RE of Kansas Region, and the region even covered the registration fee.

SportsCar also paid my way to several later conventions – Milwaukee, El Paso, Denver – to cover them for the magazine. I rubbed shoulders with some of the storied leaders of the club, folks like Cameron Argetsinger, an early president – and the initial recipient of the Woolf Barnato award (1948), of which I became its most recent honoree at last January's convention. At St. Louis I chatted briefly with Paul Newman and later watched him race tricycles with Bob Tullius around the hotel's elevator pylon.

But the real value of the convention is learning about the broad reach this club has and which any member can enjoy to whatever extent he chooses.

I think it was 1982 or thereabouts, when a couple of bad autocrossing mishaps spurred the club to institute a Solo Safety Steward program. The first SSS training seminar

was held at that year's convention, led by Marc Gerstein (2003 Barnato recipient), and I became one of the earliest to earn an SSS license, which I held for some 18 years. Before attending that convention I had no idea such a program was in the works. Being there was the opportunity to become part of a new direction taken by SCCA solo.

But the convention got costly. In the neighborhood of \$250 for the registration fee, which at least covered the lunches and banquets. The hotel for four days ran that much or more (one year I stayed at a less costly hostelry a few blocks away). As a result, I mostly quit going. One year, it was in Kansas City, Sandy and I day-tripped it and

sneaked in so she could pick up an award she'd won for editing *The Write Line* (top small region newsletter).

And then the pandemic happened. One silver lining to that plague was SCCA's decision to have a virtual convention online. Several beneficial things resulted from that, not the least of which being that it was FREE! All you had to do was sign up.

Another is that it was longer, a week plus, which meant they could cram in more content.

The typical face-to-face convention would bring in 350-400 people, mostly the "usual suspects" among the club's leaders (and more well-heeled members). The virtual convention tapped 1000 participants. Being free brings in people who can't afford the cost in time and/or money.

So, yes! Register for the 2024 SCCA National Convention. You might find a dozen sessions of

interest, or maybe only one or two. The convention schedule was just posted and 11 sessions focus on Solo/RallyCross alone! That's the joy of this virtual gathering. Do as much or as little as tickles your fancy. Same price. FREE!

Check the schedule of events and tune in to whatever interests you. You want to focus on solo? You'll have several opportunities. How about region leadership? That's always a favorite topic. National membership includes a "local" region of your choice. This becomes vour Region of Record. Normally your RoR is the area in which you live, but it doesn't have to be. We have members who live in other Regions' territories, and some of those regions have members who live in our territory.

You may also join as many other regions as you like, paying their local dues for the purpose of winning local championship points and participating in their programs. These are "Associate" or "Dual Region" memberships. Salina Region's Associate Members are fully-vested members eligible for all our championships, voting rights, region offices and other member benefits. "Associate" membership only means region-of-record is elsewhere.

You must be a member to enter SCCA events. There are several different types of membership available, including Regular, Family, First Gear (under 25) and Military, plus short-term Trial (free) and Weekend (\$15) Memberships, Questions? - · Associate Memberships in Salina Region expire concurrent with National and Region-of-Record memberships. Any Associate memberships paid direct to Salina Region are notified to SCCA Membership and expire on their National expiration date. Associate members are fully-vested members of Salina Region, although their Region-of-Record is elsewhere.
- · Annual dues are \$15.00 both for single memberships and for family memberships (which includes spouse and children age 20 and younger).
- To become an Associate Member of Salina Region, contact SCCA Membership (call 1-800-770-2055) and ask to be included as a member in Salina Region. The Region's dues will be paid at that time and added to your renewal fees.
- Or, at renewal time, renew online and you will find an option to "Add Region." Scroll down to find Salina Region in the drop-down menu.
- If you choose to pay dues direct to Salina Region (for example, at an event), we will notify SCCA and your Salina Region membership will become part of your National membership renewal.
- Mailed subscriptions are available to non-members, \$15 for the calendar year.
